Benefits of Geolocation: Central Asia as a Global Transit Hub

14 November 2017

Hilton-Garden Hotel, Astana, Kazakhstan (with side meetings on 13 and 15 November)

1. Background and Rationale

In the context of expanding international cooperation and deepening integration processes, development of transport potential and creation of international transport corridors is one of the crucial factors for increasing investment attractiveness and ensuring economic growth and development of any state.

Central Asia, landlocked due to its geographical location, has transformed into an important bridge for world trade, a transcontinental link capable of connecting the North-South, West-East, developed and developing countries in the Eurasian region and beyond. The Central Asian states, due to the implementation of mega-regional investment and infrastructure projects as "Investment Plan for Europe" (the Juncker Plan European Union), the "One Belt and One Road" Initiative (China) and the "Eurasia Initiative" (Republic of Korea), have again moved to the centre of attention. Central Asia has yet again become the lynchpin of the transit corridor system that contributes to an increase in the flow of goods and capital between the world centres of production in Asia and Europe

At the same time, it is clear that on the way to the formation of the Eurasian transport and logistics space, the states that are part of the transit corridor, acquire not only great opportunities but also face various challenges.

To realise this potential, it is necessary to create favourable conditions that ensure the transit efficiency of goods by increasing the investment attractiveness of local economies, upgrading transport infrastructure systems and creating logistics services. At the same time, a proper institutional framework is needed to ensure sustainability of infrastructure projects and the contribution to economic and social development along the corridors. Additionally, to provide synergies and benefits for all stakeholders, there is a need for a structured approach to coordination and communication among investors, donor countries and financial institutions.

2. Objectives and Approach

The conference brings together decision makers and practitioners from inside and outside the region. The objective is to stress the need for an improved enabling environment to guarantee a competitive transit framework on the Eurasian level. The conference will foster the public-private dialogue on legal and technical issues of further infrastructure development regarding existing and new transit corridors. It serves to complement the ongoing discussion on hard infrastructure investments and provides a platform to address issues of coordination among investors, donors, and beneficiaries.





3. Guiding questions for the conference:

Beyond infrastructure:

- What enabling environment do we need to utilise infrastructure investments for sustainable development?
- How to ensure the harmonisation of the legal and technical framework?

Transit corridors:

- How to ensure sustainability of infrastructure projects?
- How is a long-term maintenance ensured?

Regional investments on a national scale:

- How to avoid a "noodle bowl" of transport corridors, infrastructure plans through harmonisation and coordination?
- How can we ensure that investment in infrastructure is in line with national development plans?

Geopolitical issues:

- What are the geopolitical risks of implementing the mega transit projects?
- How to address the specific issues of landlocked countries along transport corridors?

4. Target Group and Cooperation Partners

The Kazakh Institute for Strategic Studies under the President will host the conference jointly organised by GIZ. The event will bring together participants from the private and the public sector. Business associations from the transport and logistics sector as well as from im- and exporters will share their perspective with policy makers from relevant agencies and ministries of the target countries, such as border management and customs agencies, transport ministries. Key inputs from academia and think tanks will provide the backdrop for further in-depth discussion.
